Murray stated that in the late 1950's and early 1960's there were 5 or 6 major packers in Alberta and the system was very efficient. Then the federal and Alberta governments became involved in the industry. The federal government launched initiatives of industrial development and provided loan guarantees in an effort to diversify the economy.

The result is that there are now 2 and 1/3 meat packers in Alberta that are focused on the American market and the domestic market is a byproduct for them. He argues that governments have not fulfilled their role in regulating the health and safety aspects of the beef industry. They cut back staff that were responsible for those areas and turned the 'policing' over the members of the industry. He believes that there needs to be a national standard for meat grading and inspection if we are to have access to world markets. Alberta is one of the jurisdictions that will not sign on to a national standard.

Roger Russell, on our behalf, thanked Murray for his informative presentation.

Celebrating birthdays were **Roger Russell** on October 5, **Gord Robertson** on October 2, and **Mike Matei** whose actual date I missed so he can celebrate on all the rest of the days of the month.
