Some 900,000 Albertans are currently involved in providing home care services in Alberta. Last year, AHS (Alberta Health Services) provided home care services to over 118,000 Albertans, with 10,000 receiving care services in their homes and communities. The system employs 113,000 staff members, including 8,700 physicians, 6,800 healthcare aides, and benefits from the services of 14,300 volunteers. In 2017–18, funding for home care and community care services in Alberta exceeded \$2 billion.

A growing concern as the Alberta population ages, is that the number of people requiring healthcare services, could exceed the number of community healthcare spaces available within the province. Therefore, a substantial number of older adults will need, and will want, to receive home care. Consequently, home care providers must be knowledgeable and capable of delivering a wide range of challenging and essential The GYROLOG April 2025

healthcare services. As many home care providers do not have the required knowledge and skills, a considerable number of them suffer from stress and, in some cases, put their loved ones at risk.

Ultimately, every Albertan will become a home care provider or recipient. Most people are unprepared or knowledgeable of complex requirements of providing home care service. Judy and Sarah will provide information on how best to provide home care service and the medical and financial assistance that may be available to home care providers.
