President Dick called the meeting to order and Larry Dobson led us in Cheerio. Our club Padre Rev. John Dowds asked the blessing.

Bryce Van Dusen introduced his guest Bill Davies, Walter Yakimets introduced us to Ken Bowes and Eric Spink was introduced as a potential member of our club who has completed a membership application.

David Burnett introduced our guest speaker, Les Hurt and his assistant Gary Chen. Les is the Director of the Heritage Resource Management Branch of Alberta Community Development. There are 18 provincial historic sites and museums which cost \$190 million to develop and \$14 million annually to operate. The first one was the Provincial Museum which was built in 1967 at a cost of \$15 million. It is scheduled for some major renovations.

The Reynolds Museum in Wetaskiwin was opened in 1992 at a cost of \$92 million. The Ukrainian Cultural Heritage Village was created by moving 35 buildings, mostly from Northeast Alberta, to the site at a cost of \$17 million. The world heritage site of Head-Smashed-In Buffalo jump was opened in 1987 at a cost of \$30 million. We learned that the name resulted from an accident when a brave had his head smashed in when a buffalo fell on him. This site is 8-10 thousand years old.

The Remington Carriage Museum in Cardston started when Mr. Remington donated his collection of 48 carriages. There are now 265 carriages in the collection. Rutherford house was build by Alberta's first Premier after he left office. The Oil Sands Discovery Centre in Fort McMurray was opened in 1985 and recently had \$1.9 million spent to redevelop the displays. Also opened in 1985 was the Frank Slide Interpretive Centre.

Fort George was established as a fur trading post in 1792 and it and Buckingham House are near Elk Point. Restoration cost \$3 million. The Victoria Settlement built in 1864 near Smoky Lake is the oldest building on its original location in Alberta. Father

Lacombe Chapel built in 1861 in St. Albert is the oldest building in the province. Historic Dunvegan has St. Charles Mission and the HBC Clerks house documenting its importance as a religious and fur trading centre.

The Royal Tyrell Museum in Drumheller opened in 1985 at a cost of \$30 million. The new ATCO Learning Centre has recently been opened. In 1987 the Tyrell Field Station opened in Dinosaur Provincial Park. Stephansson House near Markerville southwest of Red Deer was home to the Poet Laureate of Iceland. He tended his homestead by day and wrote his famous and respected poetry by night. The three kilometre long Brooks Aqueduct is the remnants of an extensive irrigation network in the dry lands of Southern Alberta. The Leitch Collieries in Crowsnest Pass was one of the largest and most ambitious mines in the early days. The Turner Valley Gas Plant was decommissioned in 1985 and donated in 1988. There are 22 acres and original equipment from the 1920's and 30's that can be explored by guided tours.
