October 5th, 2005 THANKSGIVING IN GYRO/GYRETTE CANADA

Sixty-two Gyros and Gyrettes gathered at the Santa Maria Goretti Community Centre for a Thanksgiving Luncheon, good friendship and to share a Thanksgiving message prepared especially for the occasion by Reverend John Dowds. **President Walter** extended a very warm welcome to Gyrettes, Gyros and their special guests that included Joe and Judy Bacac, Bob and Mary Lue Moore [Mary Lue is, of course, a regular Gyrette] (guests of Peter and Margaret Butler), Bruce and Gayle Houston (guests of Elaine and Allan Douglas); and Irene Watson (Helen Ross's mother and a frequent welcome guest at Gyro/Gyrette functions). A special Thanksgiving welcome was extended to Gyrettes **Doris** Douglas, Enid Green, Bernice Pedden, Norma Treacy, and Pat Sharp. The presence of these special people together with the Gyros and other Gyrettes of the Club added to the spirit of Thanksgiving.

After the singing of Cheerio (lead by **John Plunkett**) and our Grace (ably provided by Rev. John Dowds) President Walter invited **John Stroppa** to the podium to conduct the Thanksgiving celebration. **John** shared with us a brief reminder of our Thanksgiving legacy and noted that its history is "stuffed with surprises". For instance, "Did we know . . ." that the FIRST Thanksgiving was celebrate 43 before the pilgrims did so at Plymouth Rock?" It seems that in 1576 Sir Martin Frobisher (remember when Iqualuit was Frobisher Bay?) got sidetracked during his search for the Spice Islands and ended up on Baffin Island (seems his sextant had a calibration error). There was "celebrated" the first North American Thanksgiving "... in sub-zero temperatures on a barren, wind-swept moonscape by a muttering, mutinous crowd wondering whether 'the chief' had all his marbles." In sleuthing the history of our Thanksgiving **John** uncovered one other tidbit (not yet called a Timbit it would seem) about the ever-optimistic Frobisher. It seems that while searching for the spice Islands in the Canadian arctic he came upon some promising "gold ore". After two years of mining he hauled a shipload of ore back to England. It assayed as iron pyrite – better known as "Fool's Gold". Hence forth the region

became known as "North Waste Terrortories – our Frozen Assets".

Fast forward to 1879!! Our Parliament formally designated November 6th as Canada's Thanksgiving Day. And so it remained until Armistice Day was established as November 11th. Two holidays so close together and so thematically different did not seem quite right. In one of the wiser decisions by our elected representatives the second Monday in October became "our new Thanksgiving tradition". After his most interesting opening comments on our Thanksgiving tradition, **John Stroppa** introduced our Reverend John Dowds as our speaker on this very special occasion. To our surprise, **Reverend Dowds** promptly called upon Peter Fairbridge to read a lengthy excerpt from the letter of Paul to the Romans (Chapter 16 Verses 1 to 23). Surprise turned to puzzlement as Peter's reading revealed a lengthy listing of the names of people whom Paul was urging that the Romans "greet". These were among Paul's good friends who had come into Christ's family. Building upon this reading **John** lead us to the heart of his thanksgiving message which was that Paul was sharing a list of dedicated followers of the teachings of Christ; a list of friends; of those with whom Paul had studied; and of those "who had risked their necks" for his life. It was a list of those upon whom the Romans could depend and of people who had made a difference in Paul's life as well as in the development of the ministry of Christ Jesus. It was a catalogue of people to whom Paul was thankful for many positive changes in his ministry and therefore of those upon whom the Romans could count for encouragement and steadfastness in quest to "the god and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ".

John reminded us that as we go through life it would not be our lists of things material, of things tangible, which will be of the greatest importance. It will be our list of those who have made significant differences in determining who we are, what we value and what we believe. Although not like Paul's – a powerful list of those who helped to establish Christianity- it will serve to identify those who have helped us along our road of life and to whom we are thankful. "Put the list away with your greatest treasurers!" urged **John** who closed with this "thanksgiving" thought: "I thank you God for all my remembrances of you."
