President Jack Little welcomed 35 Gyros and one guest to the January 5th luncheon meeting held at the Royal Mayfair Golf Club. The singing of Cheerio was not led by anyone in particular and was not that impressive! **David Burnett** presented the Grace.

Bob Kerrison introduced our speaker, **Dean Heuman**, Co-owner of Focus Communications, Vice-President RWE Events and Executive Producer of the Edmonton Air Show. Dean is a senior strategist whose skills lie in understanding and analyzing information, and creating results-oriented plans for clients. He has more than 30 years of diverse experience in marketing, public relations, fundraising and project management. He and his wife have owned Focus Communication for the past 14 years.

Dean has long been involved in events in Edmonton, both in his job and personal life and sees the value of people coming together to celebrate. As part of RWE Events, Dean and his team organized the festival events downtown that coincided with the Edmonton Indy. More recently, in addition to the 2015 Edmonton Airshow, they also organized Santa's Parade of Lights in November, the first outdoor holiday parade in Edmonton.

Dean indicated that Alberta has a long and proud history of supporting aviation. In 1950, 158,000 people attended the largest airshow in Canada at Lancaster Field (Namao). The last airshow held in the Edmonton Region was at the Edmonton International Airport in 2001. Airshows are no longer held at the large commercial airports for safety and operational reasons.

RWE (Race Weekend) Events with the agreement of the County of Sturgeon and Edmonton Airports (Edmonton Regional Airports Authority) decided to focus on the Villeneuve Airport located northwest of St. Albert. The airport runway had been lengthened to 5000 feet to accommodate an alternative medivac site. Typically, it would take 14-18 months of lead time to create a new airshow. RWE completed the work in just seven months. This airshow was designed to be different and was built from an audience point of view. The decision-making group was kept small at five so that the vision was never lost. There had been some recent extreme events such as the Red Bull Crashed Ice Event at the Shaw Conference Centre which attracted large crowds over a short period of time. The organizers hired "known flying acts" who were guaranteed to excite the audiences. Young kids were wanted in the audience. A two-day event was planned, with a three-hour airshow each day. Great care was taken to entertain the crowds the rest of the day with bouncy castles and motorcycle stunt shows,

music and guest aircraft such as a working B-25 bomber. Free parking was provided along with numerous food trucks and sanitation facilities. Access and parking could be your "undoing" and it almost was with long vehicle lines attempting to access the site.

Ticket sales were capped at 25,000 over the two days and it still became one of the five top airshows in Canada. Eighty-five percent of the attendees were from a 30-100 km distance. Revenue of \$500,000 was achieved in the inaugural year. "Title Sponsors" in the \$70,000 range are almost impossible to obtain for airshows but there were a number of \$5000 to \$15,000 sponsors.

The 2016 Edmonton Airshow, August 6th and 7th will accommodate an expected attendance of 33,000 to 37,000. There will be more entertainers, more military involvement and more food trucks. An improved sound system and more music will be featured. Tickets will be \$25, \$20 for seniors and VIP seats with an improved view will be available for \$75.

Dean continued to answer numerous questions and **Bob Kerrison** thanked him for an excellent presentation. The winner of the Free Lunch draw was **Peter Carter.**

President Jack Little welcomed 37 Gyros and two guests, our speaker **Dr. Adriana Davies** and **Stephen Yakimets** to our January 19th luncheon meeting at the Royal Mayfair Golf Club.

John Ross introduced our newest member Len Evenson, a retired Obstetrician who has had a long medical career in Alberta. Among many initiatives, Dr. Evenson was a member of the Alberta Medical Association Committee on Reproductive Care (RCC) along with Dr. John Boyd of our club. The RCC in its many years of service from 1936 to 2004 collected a storehouse of information about pregnancies and maternal and infant health, and compiled it arduously. As a result, Alberta to this day has one of the most complete and accurate databases on pregnancy and maternal health in the world, and impressively low rates of maternal and infant death and illness.

Past District Governor Gerry Glassford had the privilege of inducting Len Evenson into the Gyro Club of Edmonton in company with his sponsor Leon Lubin.



Warren Garbutt introduced our guest speaker **Dr. Adriana Davies** who was born in Grimaldi, Italy and emigrated to Canada with her family to Edmonton in 1951. She received a BA (English and French) in 1965; and an MA in English in 1967. Dr. Davies went to England to pursue doctoral studies supported by a Canada Council grant and received her PhD in 1971. In 1980 she returned to Edmonton and became the Science and Technology Editor of the Canadian Encyclopedia. In 1984 Dr. Davies joined the staff at the University of Alberta and worked as an editor and instructional designer in the Faculty of Extension. In 1999, she became the founding Executive Director of the Heritage Community Foundation, a charitable trust with the mandate to link people with heritage through discovery and learning. She conceptualized and developed the **Alberta Online Encyclopedia**, a centennial legacy project valued at over \$8 million in cash and \$43 million in intellectual property.

The topic of Dr. Davies presentation was **Women's Suffrage in Alberta and the** "Persons Case".

During the First World War, the wives of influential men and the professional classes became actively involved assisting in the war effort replacing the men who were overseas These educated women were also influenced by other social forces such as the rise of the temperance movement and agrarian prairie populism like the United Farmers. As confidence in the male dominated political system faded, western women could no longer accept their inability to vote. Immigrants from Scandinavia and the Western U.S.A. also brought with them their belief in "suffrage" (the right of voting in political elections).

In 1913, a group of about 150 women, who called themselves the Edmonton Political Equality League, marched on Alberta's legislature to petition Liberal Premier Arthur Sifton for the right to vote. "Did you ladies wash up your luncheon dishes before you came down here to ask me for the vote"? He asked them. "If you haven't, you'd better go home because you're not going to get any votes from me."


A year later, a group of men and women led by suffrage spokes-woman **Nellie McClung**, made a similar appearance at the Manitoba legislature. Premier Rodmond Roblin was equally dismissive. Two years later on January 28, 1916, women in Manitoba won the right to vote. Manitoba became the first province to allow suffrage for men and women, Saskatchewan followed on March 14th and Alberta on April 19th. In 1917, when Albertans went to the polls and women cast their ballots for the first time in a Canadian provincial election, **Louise McKinney** and **Roberta MacAdams** became the first two women elected to any legislature in the British Empire. (editor's note: much of the information in the preceding two paragraphs was taken from Paula Simons commentary "How Far We've Come" in the Edmonton Journal of January 23rd, 2016).

The Famous Five were five Alberta women who asked the Supreme Court of Canada to answer the question, Does the word 'Persons' in Section 24 of the British North America Act, 1867, include female persons?" in the case *Edwards v. Canada* (Attorney General)

The five women, Emily Murphy, Irene Marryat Parlby, Nellie Mooney McClung, Louise Crummy McKinney and Henrietta Muir Edwards, created a petition to ask this question. They sought to have women legally considered persons so that women could be appointed to the Senate. The petition was filed on August 27, 1927 and on April 24, 1928 the Supreme Court in a unanimous decision denied

the request. This judgement was overturned by the British Judicial Committee of the Privy Council on October 18, 1929. This case became known as the "Persons Case". Although Canadian women (white British/Canadian citizens) had the vote in many provinces and in federal elections by 1929, the case was part of a continent-wide drive for political equality, coming seven years after suffrage in the United States was achieved through the Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution.

Notwithstanding the steady progress to allow women to vote in each province, resistance from the church and provincial leaders in Quebec denied the vote until 1940. In 1960 Aboriginal women were given the right to vote by Prime Minister. John Diefenbaker.

The Edmonton Gyro Club along with individual members contributed funds to establish the **Centre of Gerontology Fund** at the University of Alberta. This endowment fund currently provides yearly; one undergraduate scholarship of \$700, and a Masters and PhD scholarship each of \$1200.

This year's recipient of the graduate scholarship at the PhD level is **Sharon Anderson**, who is completing her 5th year in Human Ecology (Aging). Her thesis topic deals with the relationships between married couples after a stroke. She is also especially interested in researching further the interactions between families with older adults and the healthcare system.

Melissa Crozier is completing her first year in the Masters of Nursing program. She has been a registered nurse for 13 years working solely in the continuing care program. Her research is focused on preventing pressure ulcers for the Edmonton General Continuing Care Centre.

Karl Narvacin is a first year Med student and has been doing undergraduate research on brain development and age, working with people experiencing dementia. Karl has founded HealthLINK initiative which connects new immigrants to health care services.

Diana Bark is a second year Med student who is doing an undergraduate research project entitled: "Technology Evaluation in the Elderly Network Training Program." She also volunteers as an English teacher for new Canadians.

Two undergraduate scholarships were offered this year because no undergraduate applications were received last year.

Marty Larson and **Fred Schulte** presented these scholarships on January 27th in the offices of the Faculty of Rehabilitation Medicine at Corbett Hall.


