The	death occurred on July 10, 1982 of George Bissett, a long time member
of Gyro and a Pst District VIII Governor. He had fractured his hip a few	
mont	ths ago and had been confined to the Royal Alexandra Hospital all this

George came to Edmontom in 1911 where the family was engaged in the grain buying business. He served in the Canadian Armed Forces in World War 1

and on his return to Canada he resumed his work in the grain trade. During his more youthful years George was active in the athletic life of the city, particularly in baseball and curling.

In 1930 he moved to Dawson Creek, B.C. as an agent for the Alberta Pacific Grain Co. Later he became involved in several other businesses, including a hardware and an oil agency. George, although injured, managed to survive the explosive blast that levelled a part of Dawson Creek-during the World War ll years of the forties.

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On retirement he moved back to Edmonton where he has lived for the past number of years.

George was a quiet soul who wanted no recognition for the many fine things he did throughout his life. We shall all miss the presence of George Munroe Bissett.

Allan Warrack spoke briefly explaining the Alberta Heritage Scholarship Fund and the first Sir Frederick Haultain prize won by the Revo Dr. Jess. Bigelow for his ecumenical work among the churches of the Westmount area. He congratulated Jess, and Margaret too, who undoubtedly played a significant role in this interdenominational work. Dr. Jess, he said, had not only brought honor to himself and family, his district and his church, but also the Edmonton Gyro Club whose members could share vicareously in this splendid accomplishment.

Ken Burnett introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Al Froehler, a one time Flt. Engineer with the R.C.A.F. Coastal Command. Following this service he joined Air Transport as an Aircraft Accident Investigation Officer. Mr. Froehler, using slides, explained the difficulties of finding wrecked aircraft and getting to the scene of the accident particularly when is happened im mountainous or forest terrain. Quite frequently helicopters have to be used. The remaining parts have to be re-assembled and examined carefylly to ascertain the cause of a crash. This often takes painstaking work which has its rewards in satisfaction when successful. Frequently, carefully to ascertain the cause of a crash. Frequently, said Mr. Froehler, the cause is the malfunction of some tiny part which has been overlooked during inspection; sometimes it is afctory fault; and too often it might be pilot error. In any case, he said, the public must be reassured by knowing that these investigations and their results make in the end for safer flying conditions.

Dave Burnett thanked Mr. Froehler on behalf of the club members.
