Vice-President Mort Morter, in the absence of President Allan Warrack welcomed several members from Crossroads: Don Birmingham, Jim and Rick Little, and Riley Tookey. Also present were new applicants Bill and Don Agnew, Larry Dobson, and Merill Morstad.

Mort Morter introduced his guest, Jack McCuaig, and Gordon Rennie, recognizing that no Gyro meeting would be complete without a Warrack, introduced Bill, well-known member of the Calgary Gyro Club and a former District VIII Governor. Also present through the efforts of Harry Mills, was veteran member, Stan. Smith, well known as a student of English and History.

The feature of the meeting was a slide-illustrated talk by Dr. Roger Amy, a University of Alberta pathologist who was a member of a party that recently unearthed the graves of some members of the ill-fated Sir John Franklin expedition of the 1840's searching for the North-West Passage.

Introduced by Dave Burnett, who said that Dr. Amy from Drumheller, Alberta, graduated in medicine from the University of Alberta, took post-graduate work in Alberta, Nova Scotia, and England, and was now employed in Pathology at the U. of A.

Dr. Amy revealed that in 1859 an expedition had discovered skeletons and other remains on King William's Island, and Eskimo reports led this expedition to a cairn at Point Victory telling the history of Franklin's expedition. The U. of A. expedition in 1983 - 84 included medical men, archeologists, and historians. Graves uncovered at Beechey Island revealed bodies in a remarkable state of preservation. Autopsies were undertaken to determine any pathologica/causes of death. This work is continuing under Dr. Amy direction. From a historical standpoint, Dr. Amy added, Sir John Franklin was the discoverer of the North-West Pagage.

Al McClure thanked the speaker on behalf of the club for shedding more light on the tragic fate of the Franklin expedition.
