He graduated from Grade 12 with a desire to be an engineer and decided to upgrade his math skills at Alberta College. Ray had worked summers for a large construction equipment company, Alberta Tractor Parts and wanted to continue working in the construction industry.

At age 23, Ray was introduced by a friend to **Investors Syndicate**. He was offered a job, took courses and exams while still working for Alberta Tractor Parts in the late 1970's. By June of 1982, Ray had finished training with Investors but had to wait until August when he turned 25 to receive his licence.

In 1986, he moved to Vancouver as a manager, recruiter, and trainer. He moved back to Edmonton in 1990 as Regional Director and by 1997, he was managing a million dollars of accounts. Ray then moved to Winnipeg as Senior Vice-President which included attending business school in Pennsylvania. He was initially responsible for Alberta, Saskatchewan, and Manitoba and then responsibility for Quebec was added. Atlantic Canada was added, and Ray and his family still lived in Winnipeg.


As a Senior VP, Ray had no line authority but was responsible for all decisions in several areas including recruiting and advertising. Advertising involved the use of focus groups to gauge their reactions to ads. The marketing people watched the reactions of the focus groups and this process required thousands of hours to develop one ad.

During this time, he averaged 300 flights per year while maintaining his residence in Winnipeg.

By 2005, Ray decided he wanted a new job and he moved to Edmonton with Investors Group. At this time branches were owned by the Managers. Ray became a Regional Director and thoroughly enjoyed his new role. The end of his 35-year career with Investors came in 2017 when he was forced to retire.

Lt. Governor, Dunc Mills played an introductory tune on the xylophone and **President Jack Bowen** welcomed 17 Gyros and our guest speaker to the July 18th luncheon meeting held at the Derrick Golf and Winter Club. **Len Evenson** led the singing of Cheerio and President Jack gave the Grace.

Bruce Foy introduced our speaker, Chris Jass, Curator, Royal Alberta Museum.

Chris obtained his Bachelor of Science degree in Sociology/Social Sciences from Black Hills State University in 1993, his Master's degree in Quaternary Sciences from Northern Arizona University in 2000 and then his PhD from the University of Texas in Austin. His working career included four years as a Natural History Interpreter at Mammoth Site of Hot Springs in South Dakota and six months as a Scientific Research Associate at the University of Texas. In July 2008, Chris joined the Royal Alberta Museum as Curator. Chris is married and has two children who are attending the University of Alberta and Grant McEwan University.

Chris started his presentation by indicating that mammoths, mastodons, and shortfaced bears existed in the Pleistocene epoch (2.6 million –10,000 years ago) across much of Canada and the Northern United States. During the **Ice-Age**, glaciers moved across much of Canada and this movement likely erode away much of the fossil record of large, extinct Ice-Age mammals.

Where do we go to find evidence? In 2009, we initiated an ongoing, long-term research project that focuses on exploration of **fossil-bearing cave deposits in Jasper National Park.** We were interested in understanding patterns of mammalian re-colonization of mountainous regions following *late Pleistocene deglaciation* (129,000-11,700 years ago.)


The Royal Alberta Museum (RAM) houses the largest collection of Quaternary (Ice Age) fossils in Alberta. During the past 30 years the Ram's Quaternary Palaeontology program has worked to foster a cooperative relationship with gravel operations across the province. In Alberta, Ice Age fossils are often buried in the large volumes of sand and gravel that are of interest to the aggregate industry. Industry activities in the form of large-scale excavations expose Ice Age fossils, and the recovery of those fossils for the benefit of the public is dependent on the cooperation and attention of the sand and gravel industry. Thirty to forty percent of our fossils come from **sand and gravel pits.** A great example was an operation in the Edmonton area: A fellow named Gene worked on the shaker deck pulling out clay balls and then fossils. He has provided 5 to 6,000 fossil specimens to our museum. In an ideal world you would like to find fossil specimens intact in their natural state, but without cooperation with sand and gravel operators we would have much less fossil specimen evidence. Industry is a really important partner!

Doug, a sand and gravel operator in Medicine Hat provided us with a Tundra Muskoxen skull. The Clover Bar area in Northeast Edmonton has also been a great source of fossils.

A couple of new **Mastodons** have been recently discovered. An **Ice-Age Steppe Bison skull** was found in the Fort Saskatchewan area. The person who had the skull in their farm yard was initially reluctant to give it up. There were as an initial concern with legal issues for keeping it. Ultimately the owner donated it to our museum. Radio carbon dating by our Museum determined that that the skull was post Ice-Age.

Fossil specimens are now being found in lake beds. **Red, a Cold Lake scuba diver** has found a 10,000-year-old bison skull at the bottom of the lake. Fossil skulls 3-4,000 years old have also been found in **Lac la Biche** and **North Buck Lake**.

In southern Alberta, **Wally's Beach on St. Mary's Reservoir** has a big story to tell. There are preserved tracks of **Camels and Bison** in the muds of Walley's Beach from 10,000 years ago. There is also evidence of prehistoric human life that predates all of our known habitation knowledge. This habitation was likely unsuccessful.

WHO DO THE FOSSILS FROM GRAVEL PITS BELONG TO?

Fossil resources are protected under the Historical Resources Act as Crown property and are part of our shared heritage as Albertans. Ultimately, they should come to the museum. All fossils in the province fall under the care of Alberta culture and tourism and are housed in museum collections (Royal Alberta Museum, Royal Tyrrell Museum of Palaeontology) or other approved collections (e.g. University of Alberta Laboratory for Vertebrate Palaeontology).

Fred Schulte thanked our speaker for a fascinating look at prehistoric fossil evidence in Alberta. Speaking for himself, we should all visit the **Royal Alberta Museum** in downtown, Edmonton!
