Dunc Mills played an introductory tune on the xylophone and **Vice-President Georg Schuller** welcomed 16 Gyros and four guests to the **February 6 luncheon meeting** held at the Mill Woods Golf Course Woodvale Clubhouse.

Ron Trant introduced his guest, Wally Diefenthaler, Doug Armstrong, his guest, Jack Freebury, and Marty Larson, his daughter Marcia Kashani. George Schuller welcomed our guest speaker, Fernanda Dal Pizzol.

Fred Schulte provided background information on the GYRO Club of Edmonton- **Gerontology Scholarships.**

In the mid-1980's to mid-1990's funds were contributed by the Gyro Club of Edmonton, and individual members, with matching funds from the province to establish **The Centre for Gerontology Fund** at the University of Alberta.

The Alberta Centre on Aging was established during this time and the first Undergraduate Scholarship of \$300 and the first Graduate scholarship of \$500 were awarded in 1999.

I met the first Graduate scholarship winner, **Bonnie Dobbs** about 10 years later and I remember that her research was focused on practical ways to assist medical doctors in their physical and mental examinations of older drivers. **Here I am 15** years later facing those medical examinations as I turn 80 this April!

Our Gerontology Fund has continued to grow over the years, and we were able to increase the scholarship categories and amounts in **2007** to provide a \$700 undergraduate, a \$1200 Masters, and \$1200 PhD scholarship.

In 2018, the University of Alberta increased the spending allocation from our Endowment Fund from 3 to 4% which enabled us to increase the scholarship values to \$1000, \$1700, and \$1800.

It is my pleasure to introduce Fernanda Dal Pizzol, recipient of our 2023 PhD Scholarship.

Firstly, I would like to thank the club for their generosity in collaborating with my studies and carrying out my research. I am greatly grateful and honored to receive a scholarship from this important and esteemed club.

My name is Fernanda, I am a 4th year doctoral student at the University of Alberta, Faculty of Nursing.

I have worked with older people and their family caregivers since 2010 when I started my bachelor's degree in nursing in Brazil. I have been working with this population both in clinical practice, research, and volunteering. I had a personal experience when my grandmother with Alzheimer's needed support from our family. My uncles and parents, without much caregiving education, tried to give her as much support as possible. Learning from their perspectives and experiences, I am not sure they felt 'prepared' to care. This reflects findings in the literature that indicate that 94% of Canadian caregivers report they need better access to support, and 31% feel incapable of caring for a stroke-affected family member.

This motivated me to find ways to support family caregivers. **But what does it mean to be prepared?**

This is exactly what my doctoral dissertation aims to describe. I first want to understand what it means to be prepared according to the caregivers themselves. I saw in the literature that no study to date had defined 'preparedness' of family caregivers of older persons in a way that we could exactly understand what it means to be prepared.

Therefore, my first study during my doctorate sought the perspectives of caregivers in the literature and defined preparedness as: "caregiver's self-confidence about their current competence related to the knowledge,

skills and abilities to perform daily tasks, and to handle emotions over time".

Based on this, I am currently developing a second study, a new literature review to **identify what interventions that aimed to prepare caregivers** used in terms of human and technical resources. With this I will be able to identify important components and activities to design an intervention that aims to better prepare informal caregivers.

In my third and final doctorate study, which will be carried out probably next year, I will recruit informal caregivers of older people after stroke so that we can jointly refine this Intervention. In this latest study, caregivers will check the acceptability of this intervention and discuss ways to improve the intervention in focus groups. In this study, health professionals who work with this population will also be recruited to give their opinion on whether this intervention needs to be improved so that it can actually be delivered in health services.

These 3 studies generally intend to facilitate a health intervention that can support informal caregivers of older people after stroke. This research will contribute to the understanding of the concept of preparedness, as well as produce an intervention design that is crafted in collaboration with the caregivers themselves. The ultimate goal of this research is to find novel and appropriate ways to support caregivers and advance the health and wellbeing of Canadian caregivers of older adults after stroke and their care recipients.

Questions followed Fernandas' presentation:

What do you mean by intervention? A step-by-step process that includes assessment and advice.

Many of us have experienced care giving of our parents that are reasonably healthy, but dealing with dementia is another story! How does one deal with that? There are different levels of a stroke and dementia can follow.

Different types of help and support will be required. Timing and preparedness after a stroke will be critical. Feedback from family members is important!

Another comment offered by a guest was that the "healthcare system" expects that we will look after our family members!

Marty Larson, a long-time supporter of gerontology research thanked Fernanda for an informative presentation.

Doug Armstrong, author of **Giants of the Pacific Northwest.** *The Hunt Family* **Totem Poles** presented Fernanda with a signed copy of his book.

Larry Dobson was the Free Lunch winner.
